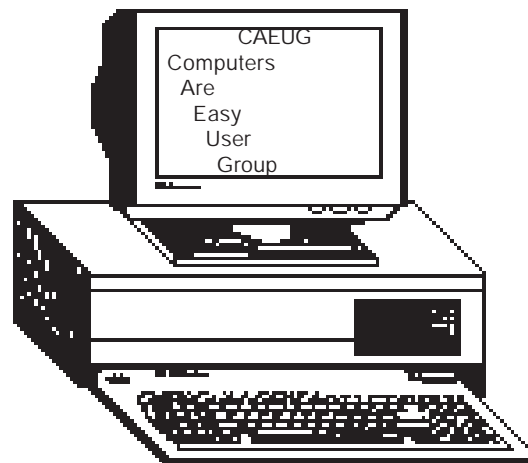
ABOUT THE NEWSLETTER:

PowerDesk Pro 5 - Product Review by John Spizzirri

VCom (<http://www.v-com.com/>) purchased OnTrack (<http://www.ontrack.com>) thus acquiring the System Suite 4, Fix It Utilities 4, and PowerDesk Pro 5 programs. They sell PowerDesk Pro 5 online for \$19.95 for a download. Vcom also makes System Commander, Partition Commander, Copy Commander, and CD Anywhere.

PowerDesk PRO 5 is a desktop utility and Windows Explorer replacement for Windows 95, 98, 2000, Me, NT 4.0 and XP. PowerDesk PRO 5 consists of seven utilities (PowerDesk, Toolbar, Folder Synchronizer, File Finder, Size Manager, Dialog Helper, FTP, and Playlist Editor) that help you in the organization of Windows. Here is a rundown of each of the utilities.

The PowerDesk utility provides Windows Explorer-like file management. It includes tools such as a toolbar, Zip compression support, and support for many other compression formats. The drive toolbar gives you quick access to your drives (much like the File Manager in Windows 3.x). It even recognizes network drives. The launch bar gives you one-click access to your favorite programs. You can add any programs you want to the bar. Another File Manager feature in PowerDesk is the ability to have two drive views open at the same time. You can create self-extracting files from Zip files. PowerDesk has its own keys stroke short cuts but if you are familiar with Xtree or Norton Commander, you can use those short cuts by setting a preference. It also has a file viewer that views most file types including sound files, which play. The viewer window can be a frame on the main screen or a stand-alone window. Some of the file types the viewer reads include; Word, Word Perfect, Excel, Lotus 123, WordPad, text, zip, jpg, bmp, and PowerPoint.

The Toolbar is a powerful, customizable standalone toolbar that places programs, files, system information and utilities on the desktop (much like the Microsoft Office or Lotus Office Suite tool bars).

The Folder Synchronizer compares and synchronizes the contents of two folders. This is particularly useful for user-initiated back ups to a network drive, a second hard drive, or even a floppy or Zip drive.

The File Finder is similar to the file finder utility in Windows but it provides extra functionality. It does everything that Find or Search does plus it can filter on file attributes. Many of the search features are click-able instead of requiring you to type in the data.

The Size Manager shows you where the space on your drives is being used. It shows this information using the standard tree view with a bar graph to the right. It shows how much space is any given folder or file is taking up.

Dialog Helper enhances Open and Save dialog boxes by adding a menu of up to 20 previously opened files, and another menu of previously opened folders, for each application.

The FTP utility gives you a drag-and-drop interface to what you're used to in PowerDesk or Windows Explorer. You can set up a list of FTP Internet sites. Once connected uploading and downloading are just a drag-and-drop away. PowerDesk 5 will resume broken connections if you want.

Playlist Editor lets you create and edit MP3 playlists. It allows editing of MP3 tags. Sorting songs can be by title or file name. You can copy playlists to your portable MP3 player.

I believe it is well worth the twenty dollars. That's why I bought it. It is an all-in-one solution. I seldom have to load a single utility because PowerDesk has most of them built in. I can also place a utility on the launch bar so I don't have to go to the start button, programs menu. It is a 15.4MB download.

I will kick off this article with the news about Microsoft (MS <http://www.microsoft.com>). MS hired a research company to find out how their public relations war on Linux and open source software (OSS) was going. The research company found that people and companies think that Linux and OSS are cheaper to own than MS products. Further, they believe that MS is lying about Linux. A portion of the report was leaked to OpenSource.org at <http://www.opensource.org/halloween/halloween7.php>

*** An internal MS white paper (explanatory report) from two years ago has been posted on the Web at <http://remus.softimage.net/hotmail.html> . It details how Hotmail (<http://www.hotmail.com>) was converted from a Unix (FreeBSD) to a MS software after MS bought the free e-mail provider. The report stated that MS engineers wanted to use the existing equipment, but that "A Microsoft property should eat its own dogfood" meaning that the servers had to be converted to MS software. The report lists the advantages and disadvantages of Windows and Unix. If you used Hotmail before and after the conversion, you know what a mistake it was.

*** The Securities Exchange Commission (SEC <http://www.sec.gov>) requires periodic filings from public corporations. The MS filing is posted at <http://www.sec.gov/Archives/edgar/data/789019/000103221002001614/d10q.htm> . If you are into monetary reports, look it up. For the rest of us, the report shows that MS lost money on almost every product it produces except Windows and Office. Those two products MORE than made up for the other loses. MS stated that the profits (\$4.05 billion) were an anomaly and refused to issue a stock dividend. Adding these profits to its cash reserve brings the amount of on-hand cash to almost \$41 billion. I'll grant that they need some cash for all the lawsuits and R&D spending, but \$41 billion is a bit much. For those of you with MS stock, I do not see a dividend in the foreseeable future.

*** It's been seven years in the making. MS was given a consent decree in 1995. That decree was to have prevented the behavior that led to the MS anti-trust case in 1998. In 2000, Judge Jackson found MS guilty. It was appealed and sent back to the district court. US District Court Judge Colleen Kollar-Kotelly ruled that the settlement between the DOJ and MS was acceptable with little modification. The ruling surprised even pro-MS pundits. The nonsettling states will continue with their suit but with this Federal ruling the prospect for success is muted. The ruling prohibits MS from making exclusive agreements with PC vendors and prohibits retaliation against OEM's for five years. MS still has a number of cases brewing. Sun, Netscape/AOL, and Be/Palm are suing MS for damages as a result of the Jackson ruling. The

European Union (EU) is continuing its anti-trust investigation of Windows Media Player. There will be a ruling by the end of this year. 60 private lawsuits by individuals are pending in various states based on the Jackson ruling. The main contention is that MS charged too much for Windows. The laws in California and Maryland could cost MS billions. Taiwan is just beginning its investigation of MS for antitrust violations. This one is also about the high cost of MS software. A good account of the United States case is at

*** Paul England, an MS researcher, has done a white paper for MS that says that digital rights management (DRM) will fail. Peer to peer (P2P) file sharing is here to stay regardless of the measures the government or companies take. The paper is available here <http://crypto.stanford.edu/DRM2002/darknet5.doc> . It is sixteen pages long but well worth the read.

Have you heard of Crank Yankers? It is a Comedy Central cable television show, which uses Muppet-type puppets in various situations. The sound track is composed of crank telephone calls (apparently made specifically for the show). The Web site is

<http://www.crankyank.com/>. While searching for that site I came across the celebrity crank call site. It uses sound bites from the movies of famous people to make the phone calls. The idea is similar to Candid Camera without the camera. The results are somewhat humorous and can be found at <http://www.celebritysoundboards.com/pranks.shtml>.

CAUTION: both of these sites have adult content.

Larry Bothe recently got cable broadband access. He previously used America On Line (AOL <http://www.aol.com>) for access. Larry considered dropping AOL because of his new, fast access. Because he used the AOL e-mail/address book, calendar, and stock portfolio manager, the conversion process would be considerable. Third party software is necessary to extract data from the address book. The calendar requires manual extraction and learning a new calendar interface. Larry was faced with the same predicament that many AOL users find themselves. The longer you are with AOL, the harder it is to leave (sounds like addiction, doesn't it?). Larry contacted AOL and "discovered that they have a new, lower priced bring-your-own-access plan. They have reduced the price to \$7.95 per month, down from \$14.95." The reason they have lowered that price is that they are losing users to broadband and other ISP's. If you are an AOL user you may want to consider less expensive ISPs like the national Earthlink (<http://www.earthlink.com>) or the Illinois Xnet (<http://www.xnet.com>) or Kwon (<http://www.kwon.com>). Everyone offers the same service. Why pay more?

The Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF <http://www.eff.org>) made an appeal for JSL Corporation. JSL 'owned' the Web address [evisa.com](http://www.evisa.com). Visa Corporation claimed in Las Vegas federal court that the Web site infringed on their trademark even though JSL did not pretend to offer financial services. JSL used the term 'visa' as it appears in the dictionary. The court ruled against JSL. EFF filed an appeal in the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals that will hear the case next spring. Will Visa go after the dictionary makers next? Get the story at http://www.eff.org/Cases/Visa_v_JSL/20021121_eff_pr.html.

The Federation of American Scientists (FAS <http://www.fas.org>) was founded in 1945 as the Federation of Atomic Scientists. The founders were members of the Manhattan Project. Their site has information on various types of weapons. They also have a database of the \$152 billion of American weapon exports (which countries got which weapons). There are also links about the war on information the government holds.

John Ashcroft while a Senator from Missouri wrote extensively about your privacy on the Internet. You can view one of his essays from 1997 about freedom on the Internet at <http://usinfo.state.gov/journals/itgic/1097/ijge/gj-7.htm>. He has changed his tune since he became Attorney General.

With the Two Towers, Lord of the Rings (LoTR) movie to be released in December, I found a humorous Web site that asks what if someone other than J. R. R. Tolkien had written the trilogy. The site has passages from the LoTR written in the style of Ian Fleming, Oscar Wilde, James Joyce, and others. It can be found at <http://www.flin.demon.co.uk/alhist/auth.htm>. If you are a fan of Tolkien, you will love the site. The official site is <http://www.lordoftherings.net/>. The trailer and other goodies are available there. An unofficial site has smaller downloads at <http://www.movie-list.com/lordoftheringstrilogy.shtml>.

You may have used the FatWallet Web site (<http://www.fatwallet.com/>) to price check items at Wal*Mart, Target, Best Buy, Staples, or OfficeMax. Unfortunately, you can no longer do that. The stores have made a claim that their prices for goods are copyrighted under the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DCMA). FatWallet does not have the money to fight the bullies in court, so it has taken those prices off its Web site. The DMCA is a creation of Congress that was lobbied heavily by the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) and the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA). It was to protect the MPAA and the RIAA from Napster and from you making copies of CDs and DVDs. The law applies to all forms of 'media', thus if someone asserts that they own something that is an idea that they have written down in any way, they can invoke the DMCA to stop anyone from republishing that idea. FatWallet just happens to be the newest victim of this legal tyranny. FatWallet has contacted the EFF and ChillingEffects (<http://www.chillingeffects.org/>) for help. We'll see if prices can be copyrighted. You can read the law at <http://www4.law.cornell.edu/uscode/17/>.

It's about time! The French media giant and conglomerate Vivendi Universal (<http://www.vivendiuniversal.com>) has finally taken the first, faltering steps into the electronic age by offering 40,000 of its music titles as downloadable files for a nominal cost (\$0.99 per cut or \$9.99 per album) as reported by the Electric News (<http://www.electricnews.net/news.html?code=8829343>). The music is available at MP3.com (<http://www.mp3.com/>), Tower Records (<http://www.towerrecords.com>), and others. I checked Tower and found the music on the front page. When I checked MP3, I could not find the downloads anywhere even though MP3 is owned by Vivendi.

The Evangelical Environmental Network (<http://www.creationcare.org/>) have been lobbying Congress and automobile companies for increased gas millage on SUVs. Their project is called What Would Jesus Drive (WWJD <http://whatwouldjesusdrive.org/>). We are fortunate to live in a country where a statement that may be considered blasphemous does not result in riots and murder as has happened in Nigeria (<http://sg.news.yahoo.com/021123/1/34zvx.html>). On a lighter note, a Web site that looks at Bible verses and shows specifically what various people drove (<http://www.highrock.com/personal/WWJD/>).

You have probably heard of TiVo (<http://www.tivo.com/>). It is a 'tapeless VCR' that can record two programs simultaneously as well as all the things a VCR can do. It records to a hard drive. The Ziff-Davis Extreme Tech pages have a project called roll your own Tivo at <http://eletters1.ziffdavis.com/cgi-bin/10/flo?y=eSr40EyAyy0HX60sFt0AS>. It has the parts list and instructions to turn your PC into a home theater. It may be less expensive than the \$400 TiVo price.

The Wireless Ethernet Compatibility Alliance announced a new security standard for Wi-Fi at <http://www.weca.net>

 You may have to upgrade your current Wi-Fi products for compatibility.
 You may have heard about the Homeland Security Act provision called Total Information Awareness (TIA). A good deal of background information about it can be found at <http://www.2600.com/news/display.shtml?id=1411>. It is a Pentagon project led by John Poindexter, a convicted felon in the Iran-Contra matter (conviction overturned on appeal). The TIA

The Senate passed this measure but all is not lost. By contacting your representative and Senators and stating that you do not want this measure in the bill, the committee that works out the differences between the House and Senate bills can remove it before it goes to the President. Of course, if you don't mind some low-level DoD civilian employee or a buck private looking at your information, do nothing.
