Have Applications.....will Travel by Tom Anzalone

Last month Roger Kinzie gave us a great presentation of USB devices. I would like to add to his presentation and let people know that with a USB pen drive and the website <http://www.portableapps.com> people have a way to take their computer with them. What do I mean by this? Applications such as Microsoft office need to be installed on a computer hard drive. But what if you didn't need to install Microsoft Office to use it? What if you could also take this application with you anywhere you go? This is where a USB pen drive (I recommend a 512mb or better sized drive) and a download of Openoffice 2.0 from <http://www.portableapps.com> make it a reality. This site offers 8 applications that have been created to run without installation on a PC. You can download portable Openoffice.org, unzip it to your pen drive, and click on the PortableOpenOffice.exe file located in the new PortableOpenOffice folder on your pen drive. You will be asked to accept a license agreement, enter in your name and initials, and then register with the Openoffice.org website. Once this is completed you can create spreadsheets, word processing, and presentation like documents. Now you have all the functionality as if you installed Microsoft Office as well has the ability to take it on the road with you anywhere you go. You can also save any files you create to the pen drive and have them at your fingertips when you need them. Never again will you forget to copy your presentation for work to your laptop or tell your teacher the dog ate your world history paper! I encourage you to look into the other applications on this site. They also offer a download that has a web browser, email client, web editor, office suite, word processor, calendar/scheduler, instant messaging, and ftp client by going to <http://portableapps.com/suite>. There is a standard (117mb) and light (44 mb) download. So try it out and take your applications on the road!

We have had some significant thunderstorms so far this season. Just a reminder, unplug the power and the modem when storms are expected or underway. Protect your equipment!

One of our members, Don Johnson, passed this information to me from an e-mail.
ATTORNEY'S ADVICE — NO CHARGE

Read this and make a copy for your files in case you need to refer to it someday. Maybe we should all take some of his advice! A corporate attorney sent the following out to the employees in his company.

1. The next time you order checks have only your initials (instead of first name) and last name put on them. If someone takes your checkbook, they will not know if you sign your checks with just your initials or your first name, but your bank will know how you sign your checks.
2. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, put "PHOTO ID REQUIRED".
- 3 When you are writing checks to pay on your credit card accounts, DO NOT put the complete account number on the "For" line. Instead, just put the last four numbers. The credit card company knows the rest of the number, and anyone who might be handling your check as it passes through all the check processing channels won't have access to it.
4. Put your work phone number on your checks instead of your home phone (or better yet - no phone number). If you have a P.O. Box, use that instead of your home address. If you do not have a P.O. Box, use your work address. Never have your SSN printed on your checks.(DUH!) You can add it if it is necessary. But if you have it printed, anyone can get it.
5. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Do both sides of each license, credit card, etc. You will know what you had in your wallet and all of the account numbers and phone numbers to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a safe place. (Place that information in a safe or safety deposit box. Do not put those papers in a lock box (in your home) because of the possibility of burglary.) Also carry a photocopy of your passport when traveling either here or abroad. We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed on us in stealing a name, address, Social Security number, credit cards.

Unfortunately the attorney had firsthand knowledge because his wallet was stolen. Within a week, the thief(s) ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card, had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change his driving record information online, and more. But here's some critical information to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know:

1. We have been told we should cancel our credit cards immediately. But the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know whom to call. Keep those where you can find them.
2. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc., were stolen. This

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proves to credit providers you were diligent, and this is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

But here's what is perhaps most important of all: (He never even thought to do this.)

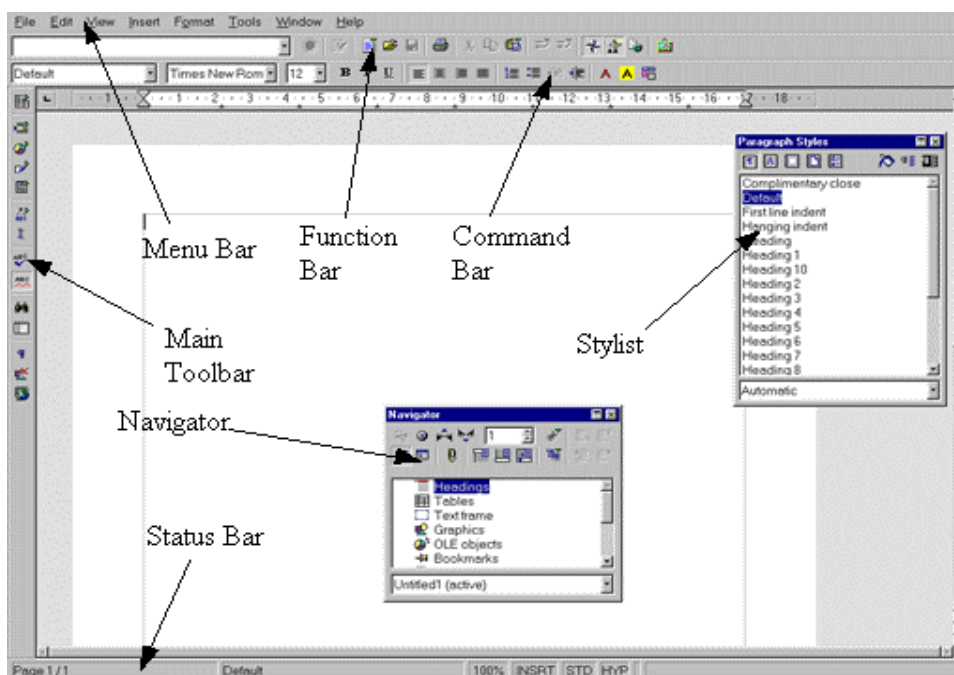
3. Call the 3 national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security number. The lawyer never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that called to tell him an application for credit was made over the Internet in his name. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen, and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

By the time he was advised to do this, almost two weeks after the theft, all the damage had been done. There are records of all the credit checks initiated by the thieves' purchases, none of which he knew about before placing the alert. Since then, no additional damage has been done, and the thieves threw his wallet away. This weekend (someone turned it in). It seems to have stopped them dead in their tracks.

Now, here are the numbers you always need to contact about your wallet, etc., has been stolen:

- 1.) Equifax: 1-800-525-6285
- 2.) Experian (formerly TRW): 1-888-397-3742
- 3.) Trans Union: 1-800-680-7289
- 4.) Social Security Administration (fraud line): 1-800-269-0271

As promised last month, I will describe how to use Open Office Writer (OOW) the word processing program in the Open Office Suite. OOW is a word processing program that helps users create, print, fax, and deliver professional documents. It is similar to Microsoft Word (<http://office.microsoft.com/en-gb/default.aspx>), Corel WordPerfect (<http://www.corel.com/servlet/Satellite?pagename=Corel3/Home>), Lotus WordPro (<http://www-142.ibm.com/software/sw-lotus/products/product2.nsf/wdocs/wordpro>) and StarOffice Writer (<http://www.sun.com/software/star/staroffice/index.jsp>). The price range on these products is from \$70 to \$400. OOW is on the Basic CDOM or may be downloaded for free at <http://www.openoffice.org/> (104 MB). Start OOW by clicking the start button, then Programs,



then OpenOffice.org, then OpenOffice.org Writer. Alternately, you may right click on the seagull icon in the Systray and left click on Text Document. The main screen has menus, tool bar(s), and a status bar (see figure 1). As in Windows, available commands and buttons are in color or bold, while unavailable commands and buttons are grayed.

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Creating a new document

Creating a new document is accomplished by starting OOW. It presents you with an empty document, a tabula rasa. The cursor is in the blank document. You may begin typing your text immediately. To edit an existing document, start OOW, click file on the pull down menu, click open, then browse to the document you wish to open. Once selected, your existing document will appear on the screen. If you create documents that have an unusual format they can be opened using a template or a wizard. A template is a document you create that has certain attributes about text placement and formatting. A wizard helps create documents that have certain characteristics like letters, faxes, agendas, and Web pages. To start a document with a template, click the new document from template button on the tool bar. To start a wizard, click File then Wizards and select the wizard you want.

Saving a document

Once you have created a document, you will want to save your work. If the document will be long, you should save it before you have put too much effort into it so if a power failure hits, you do not lose anything. Initially, your document will not have a name. To save a document, click the save icon on the tool bar (it looks like a diskette) or click File on the menu and select Save or press Control-S. The SaveAs dialog window will open. By default, it opens in My Documents. The cursor is in the Filename box. Type in a descriptive name so that you will know what is in the document and press enter. Unless you change which folder you want, the document will be saved in the My Documents folder. Once the document has a name it will automatically be saved every fifteen minutes by default. If you want to change the auto save time interval, click Tools on the menu. Select Options, then Load/Save, then General. The "Save AutoRecovery information every" item has a number to the right. That number is the number of minutes the program waits to automatically save the file. If you want all documents saved more often, make the number smaller. If you want all documents saved less often, make the number bigger. If you do not want documents save automatically, uncheck the "Save AutoRecovery information every" item. One of the best features of OOW is that it allows you to save a document directly as a PDF document without the expense of purchasing Adobe Acrobat (<http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/main.html>). Once your document is completed, click file, then Export as PDF. Enter a name in the File name box to save your document with a PDF extention then click the Export button in the PDF options dialog window.

Editing a document

Editing consists of changing the contents of a document. That could mean adding, moving, deleting, or copying text. To add text to a document, move the cursor to the place you want the text to appear and type it in. The default value in OOW is to insert text. If that does not occur i.e. the text you type overwrites exiting text, click over on the status bar or press the insert key on your keyboard. To move existing text from one place to another within a document involves the process of marking the text, cutting the text, and pasting the text. To mark text, place the cursor in front or in back of the text. Using the mouse, left click and drag across the text you want to mark. Alternately, you can press the shift key and move the cursor with the arrow keys to mark the text. You will note that the text changes from black on a white background to white on a black background to indicate that it is marked. Marked text is also referred to as selected text. To cut the text, click on the scissors icon on the tool bar or press Control-X on the keyboard. The marked text will disappear. Before you mark anymore text you must paste the text you have cut. To paste the cut text, move the cursor to the place you want to put the text. Click the paste icon on the tool bar (it is the icon that looks like a clip board with a piece of paper on it) or you can press Control-V on the keyboard. The cut text appears where the cursor was. You will note that spaces before or after the text may have been copied so you may have to correct any formatting at that point. Deleting text starts just like moving text. Mark the text you want to delete and cut it or press the delete key on the keyboard. Copying text

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is also similar to moving text. Mark the text you want to copy. Click on the copy icon on the tool bar (it is the icon that looks like two pieces of paper). Move the cursor to the place you want the text to appear and click the paste icon. Marking text can be done by double, triple, and quadruple clicking. Place the cursor in or immediately to the left or right of a word you want to mark and double click the mouse to mark the word. If you triple click the mouse, the whole sentence will be marked. If you quadruple click, the paragraph will be marked. A paragraph is defined as any block of text preceded and followed by a carriage return. Note that if you make a mistake during this process you can click on the undo icon (it looks like a left pointing arrow) on the tool bar to reverse what you have done (you may have to press the undo icon multiple times). If you have created a document and want to put all the text into another document, you can mark all the text by clicking Edit on the menu and selecting Select All or press Control-A on the keyboard. Click copy or press Control-C on the keyboard. Open the document you want to copy the text to and paste the text where you want it.

Finding and replacing text

Let's say you have just completed a ten page single spaced document. You know you that somewhere you make a reference to someone or something incorrectly. Do you have to read the whole document to find that single reference? No, you can use the find function. Click Edit on the menu and select Find & Replace or press Control-F to bring up the Find & Replace dialog window. In the find box, type the reference you are searching for and click the Find button. The cursor is moved to the first instance of the text you typed into the find box and it is marked. The search begins where cursor is in the document. If the cursor reaches the end of the document without finding the text, the program will ask if you want to search from the beginning of the document. Replacing text is easy, sometimes too easy. Assume in your ten page document that you repeatedly spelled your boss's name wrong. In the Find box type in the incorrect spelling. In the Replace with box type in the correct spelling. Click the replace button. The cursor will be moved to the first occurrence of the incorrect spelling. If you click the replace button, the misspelled word will be replaced by the word in the Replace with box. You must be careful with this feature because this feature can repetitively do things that can trash the document. You have been warned.

Placement and look of the text

Most text that you read is left justified. That means that all the lines of text have the first letter of each line start in the same position on the left side of the page. Right justified means that the last letter of each line ends in the same position on the right side of the page. Centered text means that each line of text is positioned on the page so that the first and last letters of each line are the same distance from the left and right edges of the page. Full justification means that text is spread out or compressed so that the first and last letter of every line begins and ends in the same position vertically on the page. The command tool bar has buttons for left, center right and full justification. You can type your text first, then mark it and click on the type of justification you want or before you start typing click on the justification you want. The command tool bar has a button to make the text bold or italic or underlined. You can use these buttons in conjunction with one another to make your text stand out. You can change the font and its point size (how large it appears). There are buttons for background color, font color, and highlight color. All of these variables in the look of the text can be accomplished while you are writing or after the fact by marking the text you want to alter the look of.
